


# Friends mourn 'full of life,' popular UBC grad student murdered in Mexico

Friends of slain UBC PhD student Ximena Osegueda Magaña are crushed after a search for the missing 39-year-old ended with the discovery of her body on a Mexican beach last week.

Magaña and her boyfriend, Alejandro Honorio Santamaria, 38, were last seen on Dec. 14 while on a trip to Mexico near Bahías de Huatulco.

The Hispanic studies teaching assistant, who had previously studied at McGill University, where she earned a B.A. in political science and a Master's in Hispanic studies, was in the country to do research for her colonial Latin American literature dissertation on the history of the town and the Cross of Santa Cruz Huatulco.

“What happened to Ximena is a great tragedy and a huge loss,” Jon Beasley-Murray, an assistant professor in the department of French, Italian and Hispanic studies at UBC who knew the academic, told The Province Friday.

“She will be very much missed in the department here at UBC. She was tremendously full of life and enthusiasm, and very popular with both fellow students and faculty. The news has come as a shock to everyone.”

The family notified police when they didn't hear from the couple. At first they feared she had been kidnapped, friends reported. But no ransom demand came.

Family member Hector Osegueda pleaded for information on her whereabouts on Facebook before she was discovered. “We are very worried,” he said.

Her mother, Maria del Carmen Magaña y Pérez, told a local reporter that she became suspicious after her home in Bahías de Huatulco was robbed and Ximena's van, among other things, was stolen. She tried to call her daughter to alert her, but couldn't reach her. That van was also found later, abandoned in Oaxaca.

Their car, a red Chevrolet, was found abandoned on Dec. 17 near the airport in Oaxaca, its license plates removed.

Their bodies were discovered at a Punta Arena beach last week. They had been bound and stabbed in the neck and burned, according to Oaxaca's state attorney's office, the Procuraduría General de Justicia del Estado.

Neither Osegueda Magana nor Santamaria, said to be the son of a cardiologist and an auto racing fan, had known criminal ties.

Condolences poured in for the Mexico native and capoeira dancer and her partner.

“Ximena, the prayers of all your loved ones accompany you and guide you to find your new path,” friend Lorena Casillas said on a memorial Facebook site.

“Today two stars shine in the sky and from there light the path of those who were still on this earth ... a big hug to all Osegueda Magaña family ... my deepest condolences,” said Grace Mendez.

“Sorry for the loss of these good people. Rest in peace. Hopefully [there will be] justice,” said friend Michael Kagan of Burnaby.

“I'll always remember you fondly,” said Terence Strickman Aguilar.

The beach where the couple were found had been the site of another grisly discovery just a day before the couple disappeared, when the body of a 23-year-old tour operator, Jesús Alberto Altamirano Hernández, was found. He had been bound in much the same manner as the couple.

A memorial service for the Mexico City native, who had also taught at Mexico's Universidad del Mar, is being held in Mexico City in the district of San Rafael on Saturday. More than 150 people are expected to attend.

This is the second death of a B.C. resident in Mexico reported this week.

Saltspring Island's Robin's Wood was shot and killed during a robbery in the seaside town of Malaque in Jalisco state on Tuesday.

Police reportedly arrested a man in connection with the attack on Wednesday, but he was later released.


